



A Letter from the Chairman

Dear Friends of the Abrahamic Reunion,

Peacebuilding Goes Online - and International

Unity Prayers

During the Pandemic, 7 online inter-religious prayer gatherings buoyed our spirits, provided space for reflection, created a forum of comfort and commentary on the Pandemic, and exposed 989 people around the world to each other's prayer and religious thought.

These gatherings featured prayers from 29 different peacebuilders over seven different Unity Prayers, ranging from the peace prayer of a sevenyear-old child to those of elder statespeople of the interfaith movement, including Rabbi David Rosen (Former Chief Rabbi of Ireland), Sheikh Mowafaq Tarif (Leader of the Druze Community in Israel), Sheikh Mohamad Salah Isaid (Mufti of the Palestinian Defense Forces), or younger prominent clergy such as Rabbi Dahlia Shaham (Haifa), Fr. Issa Thaljieh (Church of the Nativity), & many old and new faces.





A Taste of Peacemaking with Female, Male, and Youth in the Holy Land Peacebuilders of Israel & Palestine

In this three-part series of panels interviewed by Sheikh Ghassan Manasra and Anat Lev Or, 228 live participants got to know peacebuilders in the Holy Land by surveying their perspectives and messages. We asked these women, men, and youth, how did they come to be involved with peace building? How do they make peace in everyday life? How can we make peace during the pandemic? How does their faith support their peace building?

We were able to showcase a range of 13 voices from the multi-faith peace -building movement, including long-time peace builders, youth newer to the movement, and those who seek to build peace through religious experience or through everyday human connection. The stories featured Palestinian, East Jerusalem, Israeli, Jewish, Christian, Druze, Muslim, and Sufi perspectives, and were offered in both English and Arabic.

Cross-Border Youth

Multifaith text study is bringing Palestinian & Israeli youth together in a new way.

During the pandemic, the use of Zoom has given us an opportunity to bring together young people from Israel and the Palestinian West bank in a whole new way.

We created seven programs, in which 217 youth participants met to study each other's sacred texts. These sessions were organized by our Israeli and Palestinian Program Directors, Abed Manasra and Mohamad Jamous, and were led by Sheikh Ghassan Manasra, Rabbi Yakov Nagen, Hadassah Froman, and Father Issa Thaljieh.

Societal pressures often force potential participants to stay away from AR's gatherings. But on Zoom, the ability to turn off their video helped many feel safe to participate more anonymousely. These circumstances created an outlet for connection and confidence for these young people, who are so often the primary targets for radical recruitment.

The youth are now eager to meet face-to-face, when COVID-19 restrictions lift, to gather as they did back in March to paint murals (pictured below), meet in each other's sacred places, and eat, talk, and walk together.







Formerly radicalized youth sometimes participated in online multi faith text studies with the condition and need for anonymity.



17th Annual Multifaith Iftar Peace Dinner



Since 2004, the Abrahamic Reunion has held a Multifaith Iftar Dinner during Ramadan to show solidarity with our Muslim brothers and sisters. The Iftar is the longest running peace offering of the Abrahamic Reunion.

Over 350 people from around the world attended our first Online Iftar, which included 15 prayer leaders!



3rd Annual Multifaith Christmas in Bethlehem



For the last two years, we gathered in Bethlehem to celebrate Christmas in Palestine. This year, because of the pandemic, we held a small multi-faith gathering. Religious leaders, youth, and officials filmed their statements and prayers with the sights and sounds of Christmas in Bethlehem as their backdrop. We offered a live video screening of their courageous religious solidarity and friendship.





CORE PRINCIPLES

Today, 89% of Palestinians believe Israeli Jews are untrustworthy; and 68% of Israelis don't trust their Palestinian neighbors. Meanwhile 65% of Israeli Jews fear Palestinians, and 45% of Palestinians live in fear of Israeli Jews. (BICOM, British Israel Communications and Research Centre)

The Abrahamic Reunion has been building peace in the Holy Land for over 15 years. We recognize that creating understanding and empathy between diverse communities is fundamental to developing multicultural acceptance, constructive cooperation, and peaceful coexistence.

Since 2004, The Abrahamic Reunion has utilized it's signature multifaith community-encounter techniques to create trust, dialogue, and long-term peacebuilders in communities across the Holy Land.

Providing a living example of peace is critical to create a template for the future. The Abrahamic Reunion is an exemplar of inclusion and harmony with Muslim, Jewish, Christian, and Druze men, women, and youth from Israel and the Palestinian Territories active as collaborating, co-creating peacebuilders, directors, and participants.

"When women participate in peace processes, the resulting agreement is 35% more likely to last at least 15 years." (UN WOMEN)

The Abrahamic Reunion:

- Has enabled more than 100 events and programs
- Reached more than 15,000 participants
- Developed and implemented programs for women and youth
- Included women in all levels of the organization and as leaders

The Abrahamic Reunion is working to:

- Train a new generation of leaders
- Anchor and fund their local projects to reach more communities
- And facilitate learning programs amongst peacebuilders in the Holy Land.

The Contact Hypothesis

Bringing people together can reduce prejudice, mistrust, and fear

The Abrahamic Reunion's programs are based on the theory of change known as The Contact Hypothesis. It is based on the idea that direct intergroup contact can effectively reduce prejudice, mistrust and fear.

The foundational text for the AR's Theory of Change is Gordon Allport's *The Nature of Prejudice* (1954). Social scientists have built on Allport's research and applied the Contact Hypothesis to a variety of situations and conflicts.

Recent studies on the effect of human contact include an assessment of electronic contact. "Improving intergroup relations in the Internet age: A critical review," a 2015 research paper in the American Psychological Association's quarterly journal, has supported the foundational supposition about direct contact.

Other research has established that even imagined and extended contact can lead to more positive attitudes towards the "other". For example, knowing that a member of one's own group has a close relationship with someone on the other side can lead to increased trust and mutual understanding.

The AR's 20 years of grassroots, people-to-people programs in Israel and the West Bank support the observations of the cited research. The AR has organized cross-border conversations, inter-community meals and celebrations, and peace summits, among other events.

From this experience, the AR has learnt the following:

Enabling contact between people on different sides improves relations and provides a common starting point to discuss ways to resolve the larger conflict.

People who participate in peacebuilding events stay engaged. A Britain Israel Communications and Research Centre (BICOM) study has found that one in five participants in Israeli-Palestinian peacebuilding activities is still heavily involved in working for peace 20 years after their first event. The study also said that while the majority of Israelis and Palestinians don't trust each other, more than 80% of participants in peacebuilding activities said they trusted the other community more than before.

For peacebuilding experiences to be effective, certain conditions are essential. The host organization needs to be neutral and seen as such, in that it takes no position on issues, promotes no solution, and does not have ties to any particular community or political party.
